Methods - working together

A steering group was established with patient partners, primary care and community nurses, Allied Health Professionals (AHPs), and key cancer specialists. Funding was secured for 2023-24 activities via NHS England (WT&E Directorate).

Engagement and discussion activities were conducted face to face and online. The success of an initial face-to-face launch, led to the development of educational and networking events, webinars and interactive videos.

Steering group and CoP members planned and delivered the content for the webinars and shared their work at the face-to-face events.

QI projects or work conducted by the CoP members was shared at the face-to-face workshops. Use of innovative liberating structure methods supported group discussion and creativity (Lipmanowicz and McCandles) 2013.)

Community of Practice outputs: 2023/24

- □ Held 4 lunchtime webinar events in 2023; April, May, July, and September, and 3 further webinar events planned in 2023/24
- CoP 1 Year Celebration Event planned on 7 March 2024
- Development of CoP dedicated webpage, resources and NHS futures online discussion forum
- Shadowing opportunities created via CoP in-person events
- Joint authorship, with a patient partner of UKONs abstract
- □ A communications and engagement focus has resulted in over 150 members signed up to an exclusive mailing list and regular newsletters. National interest in webinars.
- GPN Cancer fellowships planned launch in Q4 aligned to the cancer COP and London regional cancer team.

Conclusion

The CoP continues to develop as a multi-professional community. The early evidence from feedback shows the CoP promotes a long-term sustainable interactive learning environment for all stakeholders through active engagement.

Cross professional boundary spanning group work in cancer alliance groupings provide opportunity for ongoing relationships and projects. The promotional video pictured below created helped share the CoP message. across the system.



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The boundary spanning aspect of the group provides opportunity for collaboration across integrated care systems. Our work will continue to evolve with member's expert and active contributions and further funding being sought for 2024-25.
